Call for Papers for the Annual Meeting

The 133nd Meeting of the Association of Clinical Scientists will be held in Boston, Massachusetts on May 22 to 25, 2013. The headquarters will be the Omni Parker House Hotel, located in downtown Boston. The meeting will be hosted by the Harvard Vanguard Medical Associates. Dr. Juliana Szakacs, Chair of the Program Committee, cordially invites you to attend this outstanding conference. The program theme will be Advances in Molecular / Genetic Diagnostics and Pediatric Pathology.

In addition to a session on the meeting other sessions on Thursday afternoon, Friday morning and all day Saturday will include reviews and research papers from the Sections on Clinical Biochemistry and Biotechnology, Molecular Biology and Genetics, Clinical Immunology Microbiology, Therapeutics Toxicology, Clinical Informatics, Cell and Tissue Pathology, and Clinical Science in Practice. The annual surgical pathology tutorial will include a session on dermatologic pathology. The Friday morning half day session will include a tour of several research laboratories at the Brigham & Women's Hospital.

The Claude P. Brown Memorial Lecture will be delivered by Kyle C. Kurek, MD on "Cartilage Tumor Syndromes – Genetic Discovery to New Tumor Paradigms."

Association members and guests are invited to present their research. Each proffered paper will have 12 minutes for oral delivery and 3 minutes for discussion. New for this year is a poster session to be held Saturday, May 25. This session was conceived to be primarily for residents and fellows, but members may request consideration for posters. Abstracts submitted for poster presentation should so state, and those selected for poster presentation will also have 5 minutes in the first oral session on Saturday in which to present two slides about their poster so that meeting attendees can have a preview of the posters they may wish to view. Friday, January 25, 2013 is the deadline for receipt of abstracts. Instructions for abstracts appear elsewhere in this issue of the *Trumpet*.

The following individuals will receive awards at this meeting: Gold Headed Cane: John Savory; Clinical Scientist of the Year: Clive R. Hamlin; Diploma of Honor: Vincent A. DeBari; and Young Clinical Scientists: Lori M. Millner (Innovation and Science), Frederick G. Strathmann (Technology Development), and Kristine Konopka and Joshua Bornhorst (Clinical Applications).

Social events will include the Association's annual reception and banquet on Friday evening, and the annual musicale and art show on Saturday evening, featuring chamber music and an exhibition of art, photographs, and handicrafts by members and quests.

The Run-for-the-Lilies, an annual running event, will be held early on Saturday morning, organized by the Athletics Committee (Consolato Sergi, Chair).

Participants are encouraged to bring their families to enjoy Boston's many and varied attractions. In addition to the events that have been mentioned, a stimulating program of activities for accompanying persons is being organized by the Association's Auxiliary.

Meeting Registration

The regular full registration fee is \$535. Emeritus Members, Junior Members, and non-member residents or post-doctoral fellows may pay a reduced fee (\$275). The registration includes a ticket to the reception and banquet on Friday evening. Extra banquet tickets are \$95. The two luncheon seminars are \$40 each. Tickets to the Friday afternoon tour of the Boston waterfront and the Museum of Fine Arts are \$50. Residents and fellows presenting papers will receive a complimentary registration for that day, but this excludes tickets to the luncheons, banquet, or tour.

Hotel Accommodations

The Omni Parker House Hotel, 60 School Street, Boston, MA 02108, phone (617) 227-8600, fax (617) 742-5729 is the headquarters hotel for the meeting and most activities. This grand luxury hotel has been symbolic to Boston's rich history and culture since 1855. Old world charm and elegance are accompanied by all of the modern conveniences of a world-class establishment. Nestled in the heart of downtown Boston, the Omni Parker House is located along the Freedom Trail and at the foot of Beacon Hill, Boston Common, Quincy Market and Faneuil Hall marketplace. It is only a short walk to Boston Harbor. Parker's Restaurant is the home of the Parker House Roll and the Boston Cream Pie.

The Parker House Hotel is a 100% non-smoking luxury hotel. In 2012 it was rated "Highest in hotel guest satisfaction among upper-upscale hotel chains" by JD Power and Associates and lists numerous other awards and accolades on its website, such as being voted "Best

place for rekindling romance" by CBS Boston.

The special convention rate will be \$245/room (single or double) plus taxes and fees (currently, 14.45%). The cutoff date for room reservations at the guaranteed conference rate is Wednesday, May 1, 2013. Please do not wait until the last minute to obtain your room. Boston is a destination of great attraction. In contrast to our meetings in Louisville and Mobile when our hotels graciously extended our reservation period, one should not assume the Parker House will be so inclined. The rack rate if you miss the cut-off date is currently \$279 plus taxes and fees.

Transportation

The hotel does not provide shuttle service from Boston Logan International Airport. However, the airport is only 2.3 miles (10 minutes, depending on traffic) from the hotel. Local taxi cabs are recommended and the fares will range from \$20-28 depending on traffic.

Summary of Abstract Instructions

Association members and guests are invited to submit abstracts based on their research or to review a topic of interest to meeting attendees. For the 2013 meeting, the Association of Clinical Scientists will have a poster session in addition to sessions of oral presentations. Although the poster session is principally intended for residents, fellows, and trainees, members may request that their abstract be considered for poster presentation instead of oral presentation.

If selected for oral presentation, each proffered paper will have 12 minutes for oral delivery and 3 min for discussion. If selected for the poster session, that session will be held on Saturday, May 25. Exact details with regard to time and other relevant information will be announced in the acceptance letter (see below). In addition, up to ten posters will be selected for a 3-4 minute oral "preview" presentation. Each author's preview presentation will use a maximum of two slides. Details as to the content and format of the two slides will be provided with the acceptance letter.

Summary of Abstract Instructions, continued

The deadline for receipt of abstracts is Friday, 25 January 2013. The Abstract Submission Instructions and the required CAP Full Disclosure Form appear below and can also be found on the Association web site at http://www.clinicalscience.org/annualmeeting.html#Abstract. Please note the CAP Full Disclosure Form must be completed by the presenting author and by each coauthor. The Full Disclosure Forms are required for CME accreditation by the College of American Pathologists (CAP). If the abstract is accepted for an oral presentation or a poster presentation, the presenting author will be sent an acceptance email with pertinent details before March 15, 2013. The abstracts will be published in the Program and the Annals of Clinical & Laboratory Science.

Cover emails or letters must accompany each submitted abstract. This cover letter or email must have the complete contact information (name, mailing address, email address, telephone number, and fax number) for each presenting author and should state the author's preference for oral presentation or poster. It should also state whether the author is a Fellow of the Association or a non-member, and whether a resident, fellow, or trainee.

Explicit Abstract Instructions for the 2013 Annual Meeting of the Association of Clinical Scientists

Contents

- 1. The abstract should not exceed 300 words.
- 2. The title should (i) precisely delineate the subject matter; (ii) not exceed 12 words, and (iii) not use proprietary names.
- 3. The authors' names should be stated as a group, with given names first, followed by surnames.

Academic degrees should not be used. The institution and city where the work was done should be stated; departments should not be listed.

- 4. The introductory sentence(s) should state the objectives and scope of the presentation.
- 5. The next sentences should describe the design of the study and mention salient test materials, subjects, and procedures. Uncommon abbreviations should be explained.
- 6. The body of the abstract should present the results and their statistical significance.
- 7. The final sentence(s) should state the conclusions and their implications. Uninformative sentences (e.g, "the work will be discussed") should not be included.

Format

- 1. The abstract consists of three paragraphs; the first gives the title, author(s), and affiliation(s); the second contains the text; the third states the CME Learning Objectives (see below).
- 2. The abstract should be prepared using MS Word.
- 3. The font should be "Times," the font size should be 12 point; left alignment should be used without justifying the right margin; default settings should be used for line spacing; indents and tabs should not be used. Do not use bold type; use italics only for genus and species.
- 4. The abstract should not contain tables.

Submission

- 1. For abstract submission by computer CD, the label should indicate the name of the presenting author. Enclose the CD in a mailer, along with (i) a printed copy of the abstract, (ii) a statement whether or not the presenting author is eligible for the Young Clinical Scientist Award (i.e., an Association member, age <45 years), and (iii) Full Disclosure Forms for all authors (see below).
- 2. For submission by e-mail, the abstract as a Word document should be attached to an e-mail message and sent to clinsci@sover.net with the word, ABSTRACT, on the title line. The body of the e-mail message should include the presenting author's complete mailing address, telephone and fax numbers, e-mail address, and whether or not he/she is eligible for the Young Clinical Scientist Award.
- 3. To comply with requirements for CME accreditation by the College of American Pathologists (CAP), each author and co-author must complete and sign a CAP Full Disclosure Form to disclose any relevant financial interests or conflicting relationships. The Full Disclosure Forms may be sent by pdf, fax, or regular mail.
- 4. The abstract must state the CME Learning Objectives of the presentation by completing the following sentence: "Upon completion of this activity, participants should be able to..."
- 5. The deadline for submission of abstracts is **Friday, 25 January 2013**. - 6. The presenting author will be notified by e-mail before 15 March 2013 whether or not the paper has been accepted. Accepted abstracts will be printed in the program booklet and published in the *Annals of Clinical & Laboratory Science*.

CAP POLICY ON FULL DISCLOSURE OF FINANCIAL INTERESTS OR RELATIONSHIPS

133rd Annual Meeting of the Association of Clinical Scientists Advances in Genetic /Molecular Diagnostics and Pediatric Pathology

Who must disclose?

All individuals who have any control over the content of a CAP education activity – faculty, planners¹, authors – are required to complete, sign and return the *Full Disclosure Statement* below.

What must be disclosed?

Individuals must disclose any relevant financial relationships he/she (or his or her immediate family or partner) has with a commercial interest. A commercial interest is any proprietary entity producing health care goods or services, with the exception of non-profit or government organizations.²

What is a relevant financial relationship?

Relevant financial relationships are any financial relationships in any amount occurring within the past 12 months that create a conflict of interest. Financial benefits may include salary, royalties, consulting fees, stock, stock options, honoraria, etc., but do not include mutual fund dividends.

What will the CAP do with disclosure information?

CAP will share disclosure information with participants prior to participation in the education activity, so that they may form their own judgments regarding bias. The existence of financial interests or relationships will not automatically prevent someone from participating as CME author, planner or faculty. However, the CAP is responsible for ensuring that any conflicts of interest are resolved and that each activity promotes health care improvements, rather than the interests of a proprietary entity.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH ASCP

Dear Fellows of the Association:

We have Good News! Several months ago our Executive Committee was approached by the American Society for Clinical Pathology (ASCP) with the suggestion that the ACS consider partnering with them in a relationship that would benefit both associations as we consider the future of pathology and laboratory medicine. After months of deliberations, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was prepared that set the stage for a partnering relationship involving activities of benefit to both organizations and services that the ASCP would provide the ACS in exchange for an annual fee.

At its meeting in Boston on November 30, 2012, the members of the Executive Committee who were present, (Roland Valdes Jr, Charlie Hawker, Roger Bertholf, Kilmer McCully, Vince DeBari, Robert Hunter and Nina Tatevian), voted unanimously to authorize signing of the MOU. As a result, both ASCP and ACS have now executed the agreement. All of us will be hearing more on this in a press release to be distributed soon and our Executive Committee wanted to alert you to be attentive to the announcements.

It should be emphasized that the Association retains full control of its operations, finances, annual meeting, journal, and other professional activities. We are simply purchasing some services from ASCP in an effort to manage better our operations within our limited budget, and we are using the power of ASCP to send our meeting announcements to a broader audience and to help with recruiting additional members.

This new path for the ACS represents an incremental positioning for our future that is anticipated to increase our membership of active Fellows, provide financial stability, establish logistical continuity for serving our members, and develop new educational and scholarly areas of activity for the ACS and its Fellows.
